

ISO Fire Protection Class 4 Rating


An ISO rating is a statistical rating assigned to cities and fire districts. Many insurance companies refer to this rating to define fire risk factors within a community. A fire department's ISO rating may affect insurance premium costs to property owners within their boundaries. On a scale of 1 to 10, with 1 being the best score, we are proud to have earned an ISO Rating of 4.








The Liberty Fire District is a proud and professional team of volunteers that sacrifice greatly to provide the citizens of Walton County, and our visitors, with quality Fire/EMS services. This is accomplished by a dedicated team of 20 individuals that volunteer their time to train, educate the community, fundraise,




and respond to emergency and non-emergent calls for service. The LFD protects a geographic area of roughly 89 square miles and a population of approximately 10,000 residents. The LFD is currently rated a class 4/4x fire department by the

Insurance Services Organization (ISO). ISO is an insurance industry risk advisory body which helps carriers set appropriate premiums. To accomplish this, the ISO conducts evaluations of municipal fire protection efforts. According to ISO, roughly 38,000 fire departments rated by ISO, 7,071 departments across the United States had a rating of 4 or better. According to ISO, of the roughly 485 fire departments rated by ISO in Florida, only 68 departments had a rating of 4. In 2023, the


volume reach a historical high, responding to a total of 1165 incidents. The LFD is the busiest volunteer fire department in Walton County. LFD's firefighters are responding to more calls for service and are devoting increasing hours to training and



call response. In FY2023 members had documented **4764.49 Hours** of service and training to the citizens of LFD. A summation of the department's important statistics is located later in this report.

Base Station Radio Bank with Multibanded radios (HAM, VHF, SLERS—Base Stations), Weather Station, Cascade Air System and Storage unit (permanent mounted), Station tools and storage, 199' Tower Antenna System, Repeater System with Digital Recorder capabilities (Fail-safe 911 Back-up), Station Paging/Alert System, Decon HAZMAT Shower Facilities, Bunker Gear Commercial Washer & Dryers, 400 lb Cubed Ice Machine.

5 Acre parcel located at the corner of Wycoff Road and Hwy 331 North. Vacant Land parcel for future Liberty Fire District Station and Community. Future Community Center can be used for Emergency Staging Shelter. Future area location for Liberty Fire District—North Station.








Alarm Time by Hour of Day, 18:00 was LFD Busiest Hour




Tuesday was the busiest day of the Week in FY 2023
